As your VPP, I'll offer more opportunities for Jewish students to explore the question—what does your Jewish identity look like? I plan to achieve this through:

- Having a Jewish Ethnogroup of the Month to offer opportunities to learn about this culture in the diaspora by:
 - Working in partnership with Shabbat Lab and the Religious Groups Shabbat Chairs to Pair the month's Group with a Shabbat Dinner in that month in which cuisine inspired by that culture
 - Having dedicated learning evenings where students can hear from students, staff, and public panelists about their experiences with that culture.
 - Coordinating with the VPE to provide opportunities for students to partake in the planning and execution each month's group.
- Going Beyond the Gates of campus to participate in Tikkun Olam, Jewish Community, and Leadership by:
 - Coordinating with the First-Year Leadership Fellowship to go into Jewish Day Schools in the city to give seminars on Jewish leadership and service to the next generation.
 - Building upon CFH's Partnership with Masbia to expand regular service opportunities for Students to volunteer throughout the city.
 - Working with the President and VPG to build existing relationships and expand new
 partnerships with Synagogues in New York to create a working list of service needs and
 Congregations for students to explore outside of those on Columbia/Barnard's Campuses.
